



District Councillor Update

An introduction from the newly elected district councillor BY CLLR MOYA SHANNON

I just wanted to take this opportunity to introduce myself as the new District Councillor for Severn Ward representing the Green Party and would like to start by thanking everyone for the patience I have been shown while you waited to hear from me.

You may or may not have seen that I am currently recovering with a broken shoulder, the timing of which could not have been more unfortunate. I am doing well and getting better every day.

For a little bit of background about myself - I've lived in the Stroud district for over 30 years, for the last 27 years in Eastington. I moved here with my husband when I started teaching at Sir William Romney's school in Tetbury before moving to Stroud High School in 2000, where I stayed until 2018 when I retired from teaching.

My husband is a heritage timber framer and established the Oak Frame Carpentry Co. in Nupend in 1996 - where I worked as the company administrator for the 9 years leading up to the company's sale last year. We now co-direct a more highly specialised historical/ heritage framing firm, with our

most recent project being the restoration of the clock tower for the Redesdale Hall at Morton in Marsh.

As for the rest of my family, I have three grown-up children who all went to Eastington Primary School and then onto local secondary schools. My eldest daughter has spent her career working as a marine biologist in a variety of research & conservation roles and is currently based in Bristol working for the BBC. My 'middlest' and his wife live in Stonehouse and work locally, with my son working at local community charity, The Sub Rooms, in Stroud. My youngest daughter lives in Aberystwyth and is a Weed Science Researcher, working closely with a network of farmers and fellow scientists across England and Wales.

I feel so lucky to have been able to live, work, and raise my family here for the past 30 years. Having the opportunity to represent this ward is a real privilege and I hope, by working together, we can all to do our bit to safeguard the area's natural beauty and our shared way of life.

We are having some encouraging responses with grant applications that will potentially support the church roof renovations however they all come with conditions attached, something that we expected.

We knew it wasn't going to be easy at the outset so nothing new there. But it's still good to know that the grant makers are interested in our project.

On a local level some of you will know that two of our recent events have been presented with some unexpected challenges.

The Car-boot sale, due to take place at Eastington Community Centre, OHMG on Saturday 31st May, was all going according to plan until the Thursday prior when some uninvited visitors moved onto the site with twenty-two caravans, vehicles, dogs

and horses. To change location seemed our best option so that's what we did. A massive thank you to Mr and Mrs Wyatt for allowing us to use your field in front of the church at such short notice, you really did save the day!

The weather was great, food tasty and possibly the attendance was even better due to all that extra publicity. We made just over £600 so thank you to everyone who supported the event and very well done to everyone involved for all the hard work required to change venues at such short notice.

It actually turned out that the Church was a better location in the end with lots of folks seeing the church in all its glory for the first time. It is a fantastic building, 14th century, grade 11* listed. And it is a venue for all to use. The best way to preserve this historic building for future generations is to use it as much as possible (use it or lose it).

The next planned event: Saturday 28th June, the Strawberry and Prosecco afternoon, met with another hitch. We all jumped (sort of) out of bed ready to

get baking - cue power cut! Luckily not for long. Delicious cakes were baked and later eaten, all washed down with a refreshing glass or two of bubbly. A very enjoyable afternoon with beautiful weather. Thanks go to the Vale Strings and Singers who once again provided excellent musical accompaniment to one of our events. You are brilliant!

Next Events:

Car-boot Sale: Saturday 13th September, 10am. As usual there will be refreshments and hopefully a plant sale. The event is combined with Gloucester Historic Churches annual 'Ride and Stride' so you may also see posters for this dotted around.

History Day: This will now take place on Saturday 18th October, 2pm. As previously mentioned there will be a series of talks from the Stroud Textile Trust, Stroud Historical Industries and Battlefields of Gloucestershire. Next time you are near the Church do have a look at the stone wall of the bell tower that faces the new burial ground (north). You can actually see some pock marks said to have been made by canon balls. Come along on the day to find out more! This event is free, donations welcome. The village stirred with worried frowns, And keys turned in the lock. A whisper here, a warning there, "Best guard your hens and stock!"


The children ran to see the show, With wonder, wide and wild. Tales grew tall and tempers short, "One's stolen sweets!" "That child!"

Building progress - Drop-in planned for late September.

Finally, a pair of 2-bed semis needs a few dozen bricks to complete the right-hand gable, then the scaffolding can be removed, and internal works begin. Worthy of note are the solar panels, which will be provided for all homes. You can see colour versions with the ability to enlarge for interest on the ECLT website, including drone footage:

By mid-July, four pairs of houses were underway. On the left is just the timber frame and roof (inside all that scaffolding) of a pair of maisonettes. Centre is a timber frame with roof tiles and bricks to the ground floor only.

ECLT, Two Rivers and Stroud DC will be present for an afternoon and early evening

information session in late September, open to all. The date has still to be fixed but once set, it will be on social media and a large banner hung outside the Village Hall. The objective is to provide clarity on eligibility and the processes of allocating both rented and shared ownership homes.

Please note: Homes will not be advertised and allocated until the Spring of 2026 when the site is within four weeks of completion.

From Rubble to Revival: Eastington's Role in the Cotswold Canals Project

Tucked behind the A38 and the old mill buildings of Eastington, the Cotswold Canals Trust's Western Depot is a hive of activity.

This unassuming site is the nerve centre of one of the UK's most ambitious volunteer-led restoration projects. Every week, dozens of volunteers give their time and expertise to help revive the historic Stroudwater Navigation. From here, vital repairs and construction efforts are launched across the Phase 1B stretch - a critical part of the wider plan to one day reconnect the River Severn to the River Thames via the Cotswold Canals.

The canal was once the beating heart of Gloucestershire's transport infrastructure. Linking Stroud with the River Severn and eventually the Thames at Lechlade allowed vital goods like wool, coal and stone to travel easily between markets. But after falling into disrepair during the mid-20th century, much of the canal became overgrown,

infilled and forgotten. The Cotswold Canals Trust was formed to change that. Today, their vision is becoming reality thanks to the passion and dedication of volunteers across the region, none more so than those working from the depot in Eastington.

The Western Depot - A Restoration Hub

The Western Depot is the logistical hub for all Trust activities in the west of the canal corridor. Located in the heart of Eastington, this depot houses workshops for gate-building, equipment maintenance and material storage. It is also a meeting point for site teams, project coordinators and volunteer newcomers. Everything from steel fabrication to timber planning happens here, by skilled volunteers who bring their trade expertise into the restoration world.

The site also serves as an information hub, with new interpretation boards on display around the restoration sites. These explain the significance of current restoration works and the historical context of the area, helping residents and visitors understand just how much has already been achieved and what's still to come.



Visitors are welcome to drop by on a weekday morning - particularly Mondays and Wednesdays - when most volunteers are on-site. You can chat to the team, learn more about the canal's history and even get involved. Whether you have experience in construction, engineering or simply a love of local heritage, there's a place for everyone.



One of the most exciting and visible projects near Eastington is the restoration of Dock Lock. Completed in 1778, it is the second in a flight of five locks originally built to help boats climb the hill past Eastington village. Known initially as Court Orchard Lock, it took on its new name in 1821 when a dry dock was constructed beside it for boat maintenance. Dock Lock fell into disrepair after the canal's closure in 1954. Gates were removed and a concrete dam inserted to keep water in the pound for fishing and wildlife. The lock itself silted up and was eventually buried under rubble, especially when demolition debris from nearby Pike Bridge was dumped into the chamber.

Now, thanks to determined volunteer work, the lock is being brought back to life. In recent months, significant progress has been made:

 Coping stones replaced and secured along the lock edges



- Ladder recesses recut and cemented, with new ladders installed on both sides
- Stop plank channels cut out, allowing for future water control
- Voids discovered in the lock walls (likely remnants of wooden balks used during original construction) are being carefully filled and stabilised
- Lower wing walls being rebuilt, and a new cill will soon be cast in preparation for installing handcrafted oak gates made at the Western Depot

This painstaking work blends traditional craft with modern engineering. When complete, Dock Lock will be fully operational once more, serving as a vital part of the navigation and a symbol of what grassroots volunteering can achieve.

Oldbury Brook and Aqueduct Works

Just downstream from Eastington, the Oldbury Brook presented another major challenge to restoration plans. Historically, this brook flowed into the canal just east of

Westfield Lock before spilling over a weir into the River Frome. During M5 motorway construction, the lock was infilled, and Oldbury Brook was rerouted directly to the river, bypassing the canal entirely.

As part of restoration efforts, the old canal line is being reinstated over the brook. A culvert system is being installed

to allow water to flow beneath the canal without disrupting its natural course. Recent works at Oldbury have included:

- Pipe laying completed and topped with compacted crushed stone to provide structural integrity
- Outflow headwalls built with shuttering, and concrete poured and vibrated to ensure firm bonding with rebar
- Base slabs now being defined, marking the entry and exit points of the new culvert

The nearby Oldbury Spill Weir is also being repaired. This vital structure manages variable water levels by providing an overflow for high volumes and features a sluice system for controlled drainage and maintenance. Once completed, these efforts will allow the canal to pass cleanly over Oldbury Brook and continue toward Saul Junction. These seemingly minor features play a major role in restoring a functioning, navigable waterway.



Without volunteers, none of this would happen. The Trust relies heavily on the time and skills of people from all walks of life. Some bring a background in trades like bricklaying or engineering; others are new retirees looking to stay active. There are also weekend volunteers, environmental surveyors, event planners and boat crews every role counts.

In Eastington, regular teams meet weekly to strim overgrown paths, repair tools, clean lock chambers and run public outreach events. The sense of camaraderie is strong, and many volunteers speak of the mental and physical wellbeing that comes from contributing to something meaningful outdoors.

If you have a few hours to spare, the Trust would love to hear from you. You can find a list of current volunteer vacancies on the website, and full training and support are always provided.

Visit Us and See the Progress

Whether you're a lifelong resident or new to the area, we encourage you to visit the canal corridor in Eastington and see the transformation for yourself. New interpretation boards have been installed at Dock Lock, Pike Lock, and John Robinson Bridge, giving context to the works underway and stories from the canal's original use.

Park at the public car park in Eastington and enjoy a walk that takes in multiple restoration sites. If you're curious about volunteering, stop by the Western Depot on a weekday morning and chat to the team.

This is more than just a

canal - it's a legacy project, a community effort and a living connection between Gloucestershire's industrial past and a greener, more connected future. With your support, we can keep the water moving for generations to come.



Thanks must also go to the wonderful residents of the village who kindly bake


and donate cakes for our events, and to those who contribute raffle prizes.



For our May talk Fiona Warin gave us a very entertaining light-hearted review of the Women's Land Army in WWII. She explained that, as a country, during the Second World War, it was recognised that we were no longer self-sufficient and that we imported a large proportion of our food. Milk was available but supplies of butter, sugar and fruit were mainly imported whilst virtually all our wheat came from Canada or America.

Following WWI there was a shortage of agricultural labour as men had been attracted to the cities, and it was estimated that 2 million acres of land had fallen fallow by the 30s. She explained that quick thinkers with vision within the W.I. recognised this and decided that, with many of their menfolk away at war, a force capable of turning this around could be created - the Women's Land Army.

Using individuals in our audience as potential recruits Fiona amusingly illustrated the interviewing procedures used to recruit women from all walks of life and to determine which areas of work could be filled. It was, apparently, almost impossible to fail the interview!

Areas of work included such disciplines as Hedges and Ditches, Pest Control, and Animals. Recruits could be sent anywhere around the country, and, despite the hard work, many enjoyed the new experiences it gave them. Unfortunately, however, as often happens in this situation, it was stated that many were taken advantage of by their 'employers' and suffered bad experiences. Overall, the contribution of the women who

joined the WLA was described as significant and had a marked impact on the fortunes of the country resulting in a 63% increase in land usage and a 90% increase in food production.

It was pointed out that acknowledgement of the WLA's contribution to the war effort was woefully lacking and, despite a campaign for a formal recognition, this was still floundering until as late as 2008 when the Women's Land Army badge was awarded to all surviving veterans of which there were over 45,000. A fascinating talk given with a great deal of humour.

A Nice Glass of Cider Anyone?


Our country boasts a long and rich history of cider making, with its production stretching back many centuries.

There is some suggestion that cider making began before Roman times, with the Celts possibly the first to use fermented apples to produce a form of this iconic drink. Many monasteries later produced their own cider, and when Henry XIII dissolved most monastic houses during the 16th century, displaced monks spread their tricks-of-the-trade, teaching others the best ways to make the drink.

From medieval times, cider production became an established part of many farms and rural settlements, with an increase in apple orchards and farm-based cider houses. Cider making

became a quintessential part of rural life, often forming a staple part of a farm labourers' wages. It wasn't uncommon for workers to receive a gallon or more a day as part of their pay! Labourers would fill a 4-pint wooden container (a 'filkin') with cider at the start of work, and it was not uncommon for up to ten pints to be drunk during the day. Perhaps it was a sensible choice, as water was generally full of bugs and unfit to drink.

The Severn Vale was once renowned for its orchards, and our area certainly had its share, along with local cider makers. One of the biggest producers during the latter



part of the 19th and well into the 20th century was nearby Fromebridge Mill. For many years, alongside corn and animal feed milling, the mill also produced cider, mostly for consumption on local farms and in agricultural communities. I was lucky enough to get to know one of the mill's longest serving employees, Basil Gymer. He worked there for no less than 50 years and recalled that at times, he and millowner Stanley White had produced up to 1000 gallons of cider in a single day. Prior to the Second World War, cider was made for farmers at a charge of three-ha'pence (1½ old pence) a gallon. After the war, prices increased to 4d a gallon.





Basil recalled that; "we always had a cider house at the mill and anyone calling was invited to drink as much as he liked."

Interestingly, much of the mill's cidermaking equipment had been manufactured locally, coming from Workman & Sons, our near-neighbours in Slimbridge. We are all familiar with the traditional circular stone cider mill, often driven by a horse several of these used to be dotted around Eastington. But Workman's kit was rather more advanced. With manufacture starting around 1861, the company became widely known for their award-winning cidermaking gear that included various types of mills, presses and pumps. This little company developed a range of highly efficient equipment that revolutionised apple juice extraction, and the company's catalogue (see photo) of cider-making machinery carried testimonials from happy customers. For example, Charles White was delighted with the combined cider mill and

steam presses supplied, commenting that; "last season we made 260 gallons of cider in an hour with it, the fruit being perfectly ground, and the pulp pressed thoroughly dry."

Their equipment was used not just locally, but also exported to places such as Jersey, Ireland and even the USA. A mainstay was their trailer-mounted combined mill and press units. These comprised a mill to pulp the apples (sometimes referred to as a 'scratter' mill) prior to pressing, and an adjacent press to squeeze the juice out. These combined units were much prized in the industry and given various awards at major agricultural shows around the country.

Cider drinking was particularly popular between the 14th and 19th centuries but then fell slowly out of favour. However, recent years have seen something of a renaissance, and the UK is now the world's biggest cider producer and has the highest per-capita consumption in the world. The National Association of Cider Makers estimates that the UK cider industry produces around 700-750 million litres of cider annually. This production utilises over half of the apples grown in the UK. The industry is a significant contributor to the UK economy, worth approximately £3 billion per year, and supports around 15,500 acres of orchards.

So, it looks like cider will continue to be served in our local pubs for the foreseeable future and will not be disappearing any time soon!

The Green Bit

Gloucestershire's New 20mph and Safer Roads Initiatives

Gloucestershire County Council (GCC) has launched a major new initiative aimed at improving road safety and enhancing quality of life in both rural and urban communities.

Over the next three years, the council will be rolling out lower speed limits in areas deemed appropriate and with clear public support.

At the heart of the plan is the Community 20s scheme, which proposes making 20mph the norm on roads where people live, work, and walk - especially in areas used frequently by vulnerable road users such as children, older people, cyclists and horse riders. Alongside this, the council's Safer Roads initiative will target roads with a history of collisions, with the aim of reducing speeds to prevent future casualties.

The benefits of lower speed limits are well established: they improve safety, reduce the severity of accidents, encourage walking and cycling, cut down on noise and pollution, and help create stronger, healthier communities.

To support the rollout, Gloucestershire County Council is now inviting expressions of interest from communities that would like to be considered for inclusion. Crucially, any requests must be formally supported by parish or town councils (or district councillors in unparished areas), and by the relevant county councillor.

There are two key areas where the council is

seeking local input:

- Whether your parish or town would like to be considered for Community 20s on suitable roads.
- Whether there are other higher-speed roads in your area where you believe a speed reduction is needed due to safety concerns.

Have Your Say - Sign the Open Letter

If you share these concerns and want to see action taken, please consider signing an open letter written by the 20s Plenty Eastington group. Your signature will help demonstrate the level of community support needed to move this initiative forward. The letter will be presented to Eastington Parish Council to request they register their interest for inclusion in the initiative.

A copy of the letter is available for reading on the 20s Plenty Eastington facebook group. Signatures can be made by filling in the form on the next page and posted into the ECN postbox at the Co-op post office. Please post by August 31st. Alternatively, signatures can be made on Facebook at:

GCC require initial feedback by 19th September. Eastington Parish Council needs to provide a meeting date where the request was formally discussed and agreed, therefore this must occur at the next council meeting: 11th September. Let's work together to make our roads safer - for ourselves, our families and future generations.




